### Old Farnhamians Association 62nd Annual Dinner

This year the association dinner took place at the School on Saturday 9th April and an excellent attendance of well over one hundred former pupils made the event very successful. Once again the dinner attracted members from overseas and on this occasion we had visits from Africa and America.

The traditional roll call showed that a high percentage of those present had attended the School at Morley Road well before the start of the Second World War. The earliest Old Boy attending was Eric Patrick, who began lessons in 1920 and most years up to 1968 were represented.

Proposing the toast to the School last year, retired Army Major Keith Mentzel reflected on changes in the social behaviour compared to the days that he attended in the late 40's and early 50's. "No one dared cycle on the pavement then," he commented.

This year Brian Williams (1960-65), a scientist at the Defence Research Agency, talked about law and order. "One thing that has changed is that crime seems to affect everyone now. In my day it was a distant event and I never had any contact with it at all." Mr.Williams spoke also of the importance of the OFA retaining the spirit of the old grammar school life, and expressed his personnel regret at the fundamental changes in education which means heads and some senior staff need good business acumen more than sound teaching ability. "The government keeps trying to reinvent the educational system and this makes life difficult for the college and the association," he said. "School seems to be more about running a business than teaching people. It is important that a school does not lose money, but it is more important you look after its population and build on relationships..."

The President of the Association Dennis Phillips, expressed his pleasure at the attendance. "The association by its very nature is going to diminish, but I hope we shall carry on trying to trace our contemporaries and swell our numbers." He carried on to say that Membership Secretary Tony Harland would be pleased to contact any potential members.

Mr Phillips spoke of the continuing link with the Old Girls' Association and recalled the initial breakthrough between the two schools when dance evenings were enjoyed. Old Boys were invited to the Old Girls reunion on Saturday 23rd April.

The president thanked Wally Walsh, John Crotty, Brian Daniels and all committee members for organising the dinner and on "the way they keep the OFA alive". Finally he warned; "Because of the costs of hiring this hall (from the college) we had to look at alternative venues for this annual dinner. However, the committee decided we would come here tonight in spite of the cost."

In spite of fears that the event would prove unprofitable the introduction of a raffle brought in well over £300 and as a result the 62nd Annual Dinner made a small profit.

#### The Annual General Meeting

#### JOHN CROTTY

Held at Farnham College on the 3rd February 1994. The attendance was 23 Old Boys and former staff, which brought forth the reflection from George Baxter that in 1971 when the OFA decided to remain outside the embrace of the College and the OGA he had feelings of foreboding, but 23 years on he considered the continuing support to be truly remarkable.

Reports of activities appear elsewhere and the Treasurer's accounts are also summarised in this magazine, but members will be interested in some of the comments and suggestions that were made at the meeting.

Much discussion arose out of the charges for use of the College for the dinner. The secretary had looked into the possibility of alternative venues, but the view of most present was that the event must remain at the College. The possibility of having a lunchtime meeting drew mixed reception and was left to the General Committee to consider.

The Treasurer reported that History sales had virtually petered out but we still needed to sell some 80 copies more to cover the costs. He was also asked about the interest earning situation of the various accounts and details of the Dinner account. The OFA representative on the Board of Management of Farnham College, Chris Slyfield, dealt with a number of questions regarding the structure and course strategy of the College.

Those not offering themselves for re-election to the General Committee were Alan Ryall, Derek Bowtell and John Aylwin. All had given long and devoted service to the Association and in the case of Alan and John, remain in harness in other capacities.

#### The Farnhamian 400 Trust

When Farnham Grammar celebrated the 400th anniversary of its benefaction in 1978 the Association marked the occasion by establishing a Farnham 400 Trust Fund. The four objects incorporated in the Trust Deed were:

- 1. To establish an annual or otherwise periodic lecture (to be known as "The Farnham Lecture") for the benefit of the residents of Farnham and for advancement of education and learning generally on such objects as the Trust committee shall decide.
- 2. To collect and preserve documents and information relating to the history of Farnham Grammar School and Farnham College.
- 3. To engage in and commission research into the history of Farnham Grammar School and Farnham College.
- 4. To pay expenses for students, ex-students, staff or ex-staff of Farnham Grammar School or Farnham College in respect of educational study approved by the Trustees.

The initial collection of documents, photographs and other memorabilia has been completed. The items have been catalogued and they are now safely stored in a cupboard at Farnham College. The Trustees will continue to add to this collection and would be pleased to receive further donations of appropriate material.

Object 3 was completed when the history was published in January 1991. A few copies remain available form John Crotty.

Objects 1 and 4 are ongoing and the main thrust of the Trust's activities has become the organisation of the "Farnham Lecture". There have now been four lectures, usually related to a topical issue and always with some local focus. The Trust endeavour to find a distinguished Old Farnhamian to be the speaker when a theme is under consideration.

The Chief Constable of Surrey Constabulary, Mr D Williams, has agreed to give the 1994 lecture under the title of "best Local Policing for Best Value for Money" and it will be held in the Farnham Maltings on Monday 17 October at 8.00 p.m. As usual this will be a public meeting and, as the "law and order" debate is a very topical issue at both national and local levels, there will be no charge for admission. The Trustees have also decided against seeking a sponsor on this occasion. By the time that this magazine has been published the lecture will have taken place. It is hoped that our publicity has been successful and many members of the Association, with friends and neighbours, will have made the effort to attend.

#### **Extracts from the Farnhamian**

#### **CYRIL TRUST**

To give you a flavour of the various aspects of school life at Farnham Grammar School during this century, I have extracted from the old copies of 'The Farnhamian' a random set of items and presented them in the different decades. The process of looking through some one hundred copies of the magazine has been most enjoyable and gives one an insight into the changes that have taken place during the sixty plus years involved.

To open this section of the magazine I am showing below the original front cover of The Farnhamian' which was designed by D.C. Warner and issued in December 1912.

#### 1913 - 1920

#### April (1913).

'A Committee, consisting of a master and six boys (elected by the three senior Forms), was formed early in the term as a step towards putting the editorship of the Farnhamian, as far as possible, in the hands of the boys'.

#### July (1913).

'Swimming 1913 - The baths as usual began to leak, and the water was too low to permit any diving, except off the edge. Another fault is that the spring-board has been bolted down too far from the water; as you dive, you are apt to knock your shins against the edge of the bath'.

#### December (1913).

Boarders News - "Cards" has been the craze this term. Owing to the rush for a game after "Prep", this form of recreation has been limited to two nights a week. Chess and draughts would seem to be passing out of fashion; the boards and pieces even have got lost'.

#### April (1919).

The Governors have appointed Capt. J.Stickland as the new Headmaster. He comes into residence during the last week of April'.

#### April (1919).

It was a very great pleasure to see so many of the Old Boys here at the School on March 5th, and we hope that one of the results of their meeting will be the re-starting of the Old Boys Association'.

#### August (1919).

The school now contains well over 200 boys, and in consequence of this increase in numbers, the 'Remove' has once more come into existence. There are now five Houses instead of four. The new House, designated the School House, more than justified its existence by its achievements in the sports. It is pleasant to record the revival of the Inter-House Cricket Matches. Here again the School House carried all before it'.

#### August (1919).

The School took place in the Peace Celebration Sports in Farnham Park on July 19th, and carried off a good many of the prizes. The chief event was the Mile (cross country), of which the result was as follows;

1. Fisher (a); 2. Jarvis (a); 3. Furlonger'.

#### August (1919).

The few eligible boys in the school, who have not yet joined the Cadet Corps, should note the following words of Sir Douglas Haigh;"I should like to feel sure that every able-bodied boy and man in our schools and universities is undergoing military training. Just as in the old days every growing lad was expected to learn to use the bow, so now it ought to be the rifle. Then when the next great trial comes, as it surely will some day, we shall be found a nation of arms, ready and prepared to meet it'.

#### The 20's

January (1920).

We have the pleasure of welcoming two new masters to the staff - Mr.G.H. Bacon and the Rev. W. Pierce Owen's'.

September (1920).

By the time this number is distributed, the new hut class-rooms should be well on the way to completion. "Why were they not erected during the long holiday and ready for the beginning of term?" We don't know; we say, "Better late than never," and leave it at that'.

March (1922).

No Christmas Number of the Magazine was published, as the subscriptions to the Summer Number had been far too few to meet the cost of printing it'.

March (1923).

On Speech Day the Chairman was able to present Mr.Stroud with a cheque for ninety guineas, asking him to accept it as a gift from those who were fond of him, and wished on the occasion of his retirement to testify their affection and their appreciation of his long service at F.G.S.'

March (1925).

'Sunday, October 19th, 1924, by the way, was, we believe, the first day for 77 years that this School found itself without a member of the Mr William Stroud family, either as one of the boys, or one of the Staff. R.W.Stroud's grandfather came to the School in 1847, and R.W.Stroud left School on October 18th last'.

July (1926).

Congratulations to E.C.Patrick on his success in the North London Winter Championships at Bisley. Patrick shot for the City Rifle Club, and scored 88 out of a possible 100. His position in the Championship was third'.

February (1929).

Now that we have passed through the dark days of December and January, everyone will be swift to acknowledge what a boon the installation of electric light in the School has been. Our thanks are due to all those who have helped to secure this improvement'.

We still languish without news of Old Boys. If only they would realise that we really do wish to hear from them, so that they may be kept in touch with each other through the Magazine, and present members may be inspired by their example'.

December (1929).

The unusually large number of 31 boys left at the end of last Term. To them we offer our best wishes for success and happiness. In spite of this exodus the School numbers over 250 boys-surely almost a record. And there are signs that we shall continue to grow. When one considers that the buildings are already a tight fit, one wonders what is going to happen in the future'.

'OFA.Badges (3/-) and Ties (4/6) may be obtained from the School.'

#### The 30's

#### July (1930).

'On the 28th February three interesting and amusing impromptu debates were held, and to conclude the term's meetings Mr.J.C.Kingcome proposed on March 14th "That Capital Punishment should be abolished" which Mr.H.North opposed. The motion was lost by seven votes to six'.

#### December (1930).

We welcome Mr.H.Beeken, B.A. who has come to us from the north. We hope that he has a long and happy stay in Farnham'.

#### July (1931).

It is only right to mention that the weather kept fine one afternoon while the assembled School were photographed on the field. We understand that some excellent likenesses were taken'.

#### March (1933).

The annual Steeplechase was run on Wednesday, October 26th, over the usual course (4 2/5 miles) through Moor Park. By winning in 26 minutes-40 seconds better than his record last year- and for the third time in succession, W.S.L.Smallman set up two School records'.

#### July (1933).

'At the Leatherhead meeting on June 14th, R.Kirk was a member of the winning team in a mixed relay race, representing Farnham and District Schools' Athletic Association'.

#### March (1936).

On Wednesday, January 22nd, the whole school, assembled in Hall, heard over the radio the proclamation of King Edward VIII. at St. James's Palace'.

#### December (1939).

We have passed through two crises this term. The first, the threat of war, was faced with calm and steadiness in common with the rest of the country, and no other comment would be suitable in these notes. The second was our own private property, a full inspection by the Board of Education, in which every detail of school life was reviewed by experts. This too we faced calmly, and we believe that we can say (with all modesty) that we came through with credit'.

#### December (1939).

Frankly, this is a war number. This had not been intended, but the grim fact has impinged on our potential writers' lives to such effect that the majority of the articles in this issue owe their inspiration to the war. Nevertheless, School life is very little affected'.

We wish to welcome two new members of staff and offer them best wishes for a happy stay at the School; Mr.A.J.Wills, A.R.C.A. from Crypt School, Gloucester, and Mr.E.W.Godsil, B.A. from Croydon High School'.

#### The 40's

July (1940).

'At long last our air raid shelter is inhabitable. For almost eight long months we have waited in vain, but now it stands, a monument to British workmanship at its best. All the pneumatic drilling to cut through the stout wall of the old reservoir is over. All the busy activity which, for the first few months, attracted swarms of spectators of all sizes and ages has ceased. All the procrastination of harassed officialdom has come to an end, and subsequently peace has descended upon all spheres of the operation'.

June (1941).

We started the Football season with two serious set backs, the suspension of school matches and the departure of Mr. Wills for the Royal Armoured Corps. In consequence the arrangement of the fixtures was rather a hand-to-mouth affair. Mr.Beeken brought a very strong team, which included Mr.Wills, to play us, and on the wettest of wet Saturdays Mr. Beeken celebrated his return to football by scoring most of the goals'.

December (1941).

'More names have been added to the list of Old Boys who are prisoners of war. Our practical sympathy has been expressed by collecting the sum of 14 11s 5d, which will be devoted to sending parcels to our old friends'.

January (1944).

'A few words are necessary to explain the smallness of this Farnhamian; one word, in fact, is enough - paper. Less of this important munition of war can be allotted to us, and that alone accounts for the abbreviated form of the present issue'.

July (1945).

'A very large number of Old Boys will hear with regret of the death of Mr. Edward Dean- a large number indeed, for he was the music master from 1899 to 1936. His memory will be kept green whenever the School Song is sung, for it was he who wrote the rousing music'.

July (1946).

We cannot help feeling that this may be called the Victory Number of the School Magazine in virtue of certain embellishments, which we hope will meet with your approval'.

July (1948).

The term has seen the unveiling and dedication of the plaque bearing the names of the Old Boys who fell in the 1939-1945 war, a reminder that the activities at School are a preparation for sterner duties afterwards'.

December (1949).

Mr. Bacon retired at the end of the Summer Term. For well over a quarter of a century "G.H.B." has been teaching young Farnhamians to enjoy the English language, and after they have left the school he has taken their five shillings and admitted them to the honourable order of Old Farnhamian'.

#### The 50's

#### July (1950).

This time we have to inform you with regret of the retirement of Mr. Lock last Christmas. He will be remembered, not only as the presiding genius in the Physics Lab., but also as a Housemaster of Childe, whose activities he guided and encouraged for so many years. As a mark of appreciation the Captain of the School presented him with a clock'.

#### July (1952).

'Since our last issue, the nation has mourned the passing of His Majesty King George VI, and the School has shared with the rest of the country a sense of loss at the death of so great and good a man'.

#### December (1952).

'Another new feature of School life this term has been the attendance of senior girls from F.G.G.S. to study Physics with our VI Science. We hope that all concerned will profit from this experiment in co-education and confound the dubious and the critics'.

#### December (1953).

We express our whole-hearted welcome to Mr.G.Baxter, M.A.Cantab, and to Mrs Baxter; we earnestly wish that their stay in Farnham may be a long and happy one and that this phase of the School's history may be as fruitful as the last'.

Last July ended the service to the School of Mr.W.F.Wickens - "Bill", as he was affectionately called. He has been taking Physical Training at the School for 26 years and during that time has trained and inspired succeeding generations of boys in gymnastics, boxing and fencing. Good wishes, Bill, for a happy retirement from your work at F.G.S.'

#### July (1954).

We are pleased and proud at the distinction recently gained by David Garrett; he has been made a Queen's Scout, the highest honour in Scouting, and is the first of the School Troop to do so'.

#### December (1957).

The School opened this term with a feeling of sadness and a profound sense of loss at the news of the passing of Mr.Morgan only two days before. He has been Headmaster for thirty years, and in that time he left the induring impress of his personality on the School and on the characters of the boys who passed through his care and who now remember him with respect and affection. A large party of masters and boys attended the memorial service on September 12th at the Parish Church.

#### December (1958).

Under the enthusiastic and able leadership of J.R.Edmunds, the school shooting team enjoyed its most ambitious and successful season. Six matches were fired, the School being successful on every occasion'.

#### The 60's

July (1960).

The revised scheme for the first instalment of the remodelling of the school, to provide for a two stream entry and a sixth form of 120 boys, at a cost of £131,843 had been approved by the Surrey Education Committee'.

March (1961).

'After 33 years as head of the maths department and 11 as deputy headmaster, Mr. E. Munton - known affectionately as "Mu" to many generations of boys - retired last summer'.

July (1961).

In a most enterprising effort, Jeffery Tate inspired and produced a very good performance of Samuel Beckett's "Waiting for Godot" in the school hall on May 5th'.

December (1961).

'At last! The moment generations of boys have looked forward to! The huts are down! Those shabby, summer-stuffy, winter-draughty, ghastly old temporary monstrosities have been razed to the ground'.

July (1962).

Thanks to the generosity of the Old Farnhamians Association, a sight-screen has already been in use for one or two of the cricket games; this is the fulfilment of a long felt want and we at school are deeply grateful'.

July (1963).

Inter Grammar School Athletic Sports, Motspur Park, 30th May.

Our small select team gave its best performance since 1938.

On a fine warm afternoon every boy excelled himself and gave either a personal best performance or did better than existing School or District Records'.

December (1963).

The visits of H.R.H. The Duchess of Gloucester and the Field Marshal Lord Montgomery have certainly given us some excitement in the last six months - and two extra day's holiday. A minor era too ended with the retirement of Mr. R.B Varey in July, after close on forty years at F.G.S.'

July (1966).

'A strong under 14 cricket team, with six members of the Colts usually available, were unbeaten in their limited number of fixtures.

Those who represented the side were;

Anderson\*; Turpin; Wootton\*; Parson; Potterton; Newman\*; Osborne\*; O'Neill; Gardner; Heatley; Hall.N.\*; Pride\*; Potter; Scard; and Brunt. (Denotes District player)'.

December (1966).

If this means greater criticism of the magazine it is a step towards more participation in the running of the 'Farnhamian'.

#### July (1973).

This is the last 'Farnhamian'. Its lethargy can be felt throughout its every page. Despite this, we hope you enjoy it - we didn't. There may well be no magazine next year'.



#### **Governors Report**

Since I wrote my last report, much has been happening at the College!

The new Trust Deed is imminent, so I am told. Many of you may not be aware of the fact that almost all the land and buildings that the College occupies is owned by a Trust that apparently dates back to before the Reformation! This means that The Governors cannot embark on the current fashionable pursuit of "selling the family silver" if times get hard, a route that some colleges are already taking to try and comply with current government requirements. Requests have to be made to the Trustees for funding as and when required. This has just been done in the form of a substantial grant to equip the new Media Studio with "state of the art" video and audio equipment which will give Farnham College the edge over the other colleges in the area. I was invited to attend this meeting of The Trustees as an observer, along with other new Trustees that will be appointed when the new Deed is in force.

The Principal, Kathleen Kimber, continues to work incredibly hard to ensure that the college remains successful. Close links are maintained by Kathleen with the Old Farnhamians Association. In fact, by the time you read this there will have been a lunch meeting with our President and our Secretary. I know that Kathleen would like to forge even stronger links with the OFA. There are many of us who are involved in businesses of all types in the local area. If any of you reading this would like to make a personal contribution to the College" on the hill" in the form of work experience or work shadowing offers for the students, please contact Kathleen on 01252 716988 or fax 01252 723969. If any of you have access to training videos or training literature that you would like to donate, then that would be equally acceptable. One Old Farnhamian, Roger Remington, has already done this in the form of a Water Board video.

This brings me to my next point and that is the continuing expansion of the College (a current government requirement). In the last three years this has totalled some 19% in spite of a demographic fall in the 16-19 year old population. The target has been exceeded in the academic year August 1993 to July 1994! One exciting development in this area is a greater commitment to serving the total community. This will be achieved in the coming year by offering increased facilities, expertise and opportunities to post 18 year old students. Surrey Training and Enterprise Council are assisting in forging links with local business for the College to provide training for local work forces (in line with the national target of developing the total work force). If any of you have a training requirement then please contact Kathleen Kimber.

In the past year large amounts of money have been spent on the College buildings to meet the rigorous demands of the latest Health and Safety Regulations. It is the intention to replace all temporary accommodation (still affectionately known as "The Huts", though I hasten to add, NOT the same First World War huts that many of us knew) in the last five years with a permanent building.

The wheel has come full circle - only it seems to do it at a faster rate of knots these days!

In line with most of the public service sector undertakings the College now has a Charter. I sometimes wonder how some of the previous headmasters would view life in 1994 - but that is probably better left to speculation!

#### HISTORY AND THE SCHOOL / COLLEGE

It is the intention to include in the 'Newsletter' some historical facts which could be of interest to all. The main source of these facts is Ned Godsil, who has a tremendous knowledge of Farnham and the School, and the first article was suggested by him.

The following is an abbreviated version of a detailed account of John Byworth in the magazine issued by Farnham Museum Society.

Did you know that Farnham Town has a motto? It is very neat; just two words suggesting integrity and quality. You may have seen the motto as part of the town's Armorial Bearings which are on display in the Council Offices in South Street and on the official Town Guide Books.

The motto of 'By...Worth' is adapted from the name of a one-time much respected benefactor to Farnham. John Byworth, who died on 4th October 1623. He was a clothier by trade and he bequeathed numerous charitable gifts to the town.

John Byworth originated from Kent and moved into our area to marry a Petronell Brodbridge at St. Mary's Parish Church, Guildford on 2nd July 1604. In 1606 two messuages in West Street, Farnham became available and in the following January John purchased both properties. It was his intention to improve the buildings and give him a top quality house in one of the most attractive areas of Farnham.

On his death in 1623, and of Petronell in 1628, the properties changed hands several times. For example in 1646 it was purchased by Henry Vernon of Culver Hall (now Farnham Library) for £300. Eventually, on 26th March 1679, it was conveyed for £250 to George Morley, Bishop of Winchester who in the following year gave it by deed of trust for the School-master's House. Later it became the Boys' Grammar School, and then the Girls' Grammar School.

Now the property, 25. West Street, accommodates the Adult Education Institute in part of the building and the other part is the annexe for the West Surrey College of Art and Design with various workrooms where John Byworth had barns and stables; and beyond, students can enjoy their leisure moments sunning themselves on John's grass plots.


No known illustrations of the 16th and 17th century 'Byworths' exist but at the same date when alterations were made to one of the messuages, a great upright 10 foot long, carved beam with a carved bracket at the top, was rescued and housed in what was the new building in Morley Road of the Boys' Grammar School, and now in the Sixth Form College. In the centre of the beam is a carved shield with the date 1607, obviously the year when John was rebuilding part of the property as made clear in his will.

Readers will remember the great upright in the Physics Lab. and it is now situated in the entrance hall, next to the war memorial Over the years hundreds of boys and now girls have seen this structure and probably had no idea where it originated.

Perhaps the above answers a few questions for many Old Boys.

#### MIKE FOSTER



#### A PROFILE OF MIKE FOSTER

(1949 - 1982)

Mike Foster was born in the village of Kirton, which is near Boston, in Lincolnshire, a little over seventy years ago, and began his education at the local village school. He moved on to Boston Grammar School, and from there won a place at St. Edmund Hall, Oxford.

The events of the Second World War postponed the continuation of his education, and he decided to enlist in the Royal Air Force in the early 1940's. He began learning the elements of flying on Magister Trainers, and then went across to Canada for further experience on Tiger Moths and Oxfords.

Returning home in 1942, he converted onto Wellington bombers and finally to Halifaxes, beginning his operational experience with four attacks on Hamburg in July 1943. He went on to complete a 'tour' of 33 operations and was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross (DFC).


After some months of flying as an instructor at Abingdon, he was 'demobbed'in time to take up his delayed education again at Oxford, reading English and a course on Teacher Training.

He applied for a position at Farnham Grammar School in 1949, and began teaching English there in the same year. He was to spend thirty three years at the school and the college, following Mr.Beeken as Head of English, until his retirement in 1982.

During his time at F.G.S. he was always very active in both football and cricket and is well known in the area for his association with Farnham C.C. and several other local teams over the years.

Mike Foster has four children, and even when they were young, he and his wife, Ann, who was also a teacher, shared an interest in travelling abroad. Since retirement they have developed this passion for seeing other countries and cultures, and have travelled through many parts of the world. It is clear that they regard their visits to Egypt, Central Asia and South America as very special, and the desire to explore further is still with them.

## GEORGE BAXTER



#### A PROFILE OF GEORGE BAXTER

(1953 - 1970)

George Baxter was born in Belvedere, Kent over eighty years ago and is yet another old Grammar School master to reach four score years plus.

He was educated at another Grammar School, being Sir Thomas Rich's at Gloucester, and moved on to Downing College, Cambridge, where he earned a B.A. in Natural Science and a Masters degree in the same subject.

He prepared for teaching by training at Charterhouse and his first appointment was at Mill Hill School in north west London. From here he moved to University College School (UCS) in Hampstead, but his teaching career was then interrupted by over six years serving in the second world war.

On his demobilisation he returned to UCS and became Vice Master (An unfortunate title according to George) and in 1953 came to Farnham Grammar School as Headmaster. Here he had the difficult task of taking over from Frank Morgan and did this successfully, taking the school almost to the stage whereby it changed to a Sixth Form College.


On Leaving the school he became chairman of Surrey Schools Council and later a Field Officer and finally worked over five years in a part time position with the University of Surrey at Guildford.

Since retiring he has undertaken many posts including governorship of The International Briefing Centre at Farnham Castle, The Lord Treloar College, Pierrepoint and Barfield Schools. He has been active in the world of scouting for over thirty years and is Chairman of the Appointments Committee, who are responsible for interviewing any potential scout leaders.

He was a founder member of the Farnham Visitors Council and like 'Ned Godsil' acted as a town guide. In the town he was chairman of the Farnham Society for three years, local chairman for the West Surrey Centre for the National Trust and founder/chairman, and now president of the N.A.D.F.A.S.

Both George and his wife Peggy have been heavily involved in supporting local organisations, and were a remarkable partnership up to her death in very recent years. He has a son and a daughter and seven grandchildren.

## **NED GODSIL**



#### A PROFILE OF NED GODSIL

(1939 - 1971)

Mr Godsil was born on a farm in County Cork, Eire in 1909, so you would be right in saying that he has reached a ripe old age.

He is an Arts Graduate of Trinity College, Dublin who received his primary education in Cork and his secondary education at a boarding school in Dublin. In 1939 he joined Farnham Grammar School from Croydon High School, where English was the main subject he taught.

His main subject at Farnham was Mathematics, and in particular Geometry. During his time at the school he served as House Master for Harding House and was instrumental in the operation of the school Combined Army Cadet Force.

He was at the school when the changeover to a Sixth Form College took place and served as temporary Headmaster for a short time, and then a long period as deputy Headmaster. During the years at Farnham Grammar School he enjoyed the affectionate nickname of 'Joe' and is now known to most as 'Ned'. In 1971 he retired from the college.

In retirement he remained for some years on the board of the Redgrave Theatre and both he and his late wife enjoyed this connection with the theatre. He was involved with the Farnham Visitors' Council and organised and took part in Town Walks'. Over the years he has interested himself in the history of the town, and is regarded as something of an expert.

His interest in history generally, includes the Grammar School and he possesses a tremendous amount of memorabilia and knowledge of the history of the school from its earliest days. He is kindly preparing information for future issues of this Newsletter, and readers will be surprised to read some of the information that has been unearthed.

### LEONARD EVANS



#### A PROFILE OF LEONARD EVANS

(1945 - 1973)

Reduced to near total blindness at the age of 81 could be described as extremely trying circumstances, but in Leonard Evans's case there seems to be no hint of exasperation or woe. His wife and good neighbours are his guides around Farnham, where he meets Old Boys from time to time, and ensconced in his study and surrounded by electronic equipment which he controls with the touch of a teenager he is able to indulge his love of music.

Son of a parson, he was educated at St. Edmunds School, Canterbury, and Selwyn College, Cambridge, where he rubbed shoulders with the Reverend Jaggs who some will remember as Vicar of Hale Parish. The results of his toils at university were modest, but on the river he excelled. His first teaching appointment was at a public school at Edinburgh and the second at the Oratory School at Woodcote where he taught mathematics, French, German, physics, chemistry, and in addition paraded with the Local Defence Volunteers.

His career was cut short in 1940 when he contracted tuberculosis and was obliged to spend two and a half years in Milford Hospital. Those years were not entirely wasted. He came into contact with many who had not shared his upbringing and perhaps as a result he became a member of the Communist Party. We do not know if this information was volunteered to the governors of Farnham Grammar School at the time of his interview.

Leonard took up his duties in September 1945 in room seven of the huts, where, once again, he was called upon to teach several subjects to the junior school. A year later he took over senior chemistry when Mr. Tomlinson retired. Controversy was soon to engulf him. He attended a Daily Worker meeting at the Central Club in South Street organised by Mary Watson, whom he knew. She had some difficulty controlling rowdy Young Conservatives and asked Leonard if he would take the chair and settle the meeting down, which he did. The event made the local press and letters concerning the desirability of 'red' schoolmasters were published. The sixth form wrote its own letter in support of their chemistry master and Wendell Evans (who taught geography) also wrote explaining that it was not he who had chaired the meeting. At the next Speech Day Leonard was omitted from the staff invitations for tea with the Governors and, in support, his colleagues declined to attend. In retrospect and with the passage of time, perhaps a storm in a tea cup.

In all Leonard Evans spent 28 years at FGS and The College. He speaks with affection of all the staff and stays in contact with many of them as best he can. He remembers his boys well and says that he can date most by whether they call him Charlie or Chin. The latter was a cruel reference to his facial profile and, he says, was the reason for growing a beard, which improved his self esteem. His son was School Captain in its final year. #### Southern Dinner / Lunch

#### **DUDLEY BACKHURST**

This annual event has now been held every year since 1962 and can now probably be considered as a firm fixture in the OFA year. It owes its origin to a chance meeting between John Stroud and Leslie Luff at a Rotary Lunch held in Southampton about thirty years after they had left school. John was the Headmaster at King Edward VI School and Leslie was divisional sales manager (retail) of Shellmex and BP Ltd. Later they met with Freddie Grinstead, who was then manager of the London Road Branch of the Midland Bank. All had been at FGS in the 1920's. It was at this time that they had the idea of trying to arrange a reunion for Old Boys who lived or worked in the Southampton area.

In 1959 I arrived in Southampton, after spending two years at Newcastle-upon-Tyne and had had no contact with any Old Boys in the area. However, John Stroud discovered that I was here and invited me to join them for lunch at the Royal Southampton Yacht Club, where I believe they had been meeting fairly regularly. At that lunch the idea of the Southampton Dinner was broached and the first dinner was held at the Dolphin Hotel on 30th November, 1962. It was attended by 17 Old Farnhamians, including George Baxter and Eric Munton who were guests, and George Ashton a former master who lived in Fareham.

In the early days John Stroud acted as the Secretary and Freddie Grinstead as the Treasurer. This arrangement continued until Freddie moved to Devon in 1969. I took over as Treasurer and in the following year I became Secretary as well when John also moved away. It has continued this way ever since, not because I won't relinquish the job, but because I am one of the few who has continued to live in the Southampton area.

Over the period of 32 years we have welcomed over 100 different Old Boys, but on any one occasion we usually manage to gather about twenty. The catchment area has never been restricted and all are most welcome to come along. Because our numbers are small the occasion has a very different style from the Annual Dinner in Farnham. It is distinctly less formal because that is the way we like it; we just enjoy one another's company.

Of the 17 attending the first dinner in 1962 four were present last year. George Baxter comes quite frequently, David Horry has never missed, I have attended on most occasions, but we were particularly pleased to welcome back Redvers Godsland who has not attended since 1973. He is now in his 93rd year and came over from the Isle of Wight.

Until 1990 we had always had the dinner at the Dolphin Hotel. However, numbers were beginning to decline for none of us were getting any younger and the thought of driving to Southampton on a dark, usually wet, October night, no longer appealed. After consultation we decided to change to a mid-week, lunchtime meeting and to move away from the Southampton city centre. We now meet at the Busketts Lawn Hotel at Woodlands. This is a small, family hotel on the edge of the New Forest and not too far from the M27. Numbers are back up to the low twenties and most welcomed the move. The third Wednesday in October is our spot on the calendar, and if you would like to come along do please contact me.

I don't know how much longer we shall continue, but 1994 will see our 33rd meeting. John Stroud was always surprised that the event continued for so long from what began as a chance meeting between two Old Farnhamians away from Farnham.

#### Commentary on Annual Accounts Year Ending 30th November 1993

CURRENT ACCOUNTS; This deals with the collection of annual subscriptions and the "day to day" receipts and payments of the Association.

Looking at the history project it can be seen that we are approximately £600 from breakeven over the two years. In 1992 many people made additional donations to the Life Membership Account when they purchased copies of the book (£868).

Because the accounts are prepared, based on money received and money paid, the Annual Dinner shows a loss in 1993 and a profit in 1992. This is because we were negotiating with the College for a reduction in the Hall hire fee for 1992 which was not paid until 1993.

The Football Club money received in 1993 (£163) were funds remaining when the club was dissolved.

The Morgan Gate repair (£100) was to replace the letter "M" removed by a "joker" some time ago.

When the Association meets at the College the room is no longer free, a hire fee has to be paid (£23).

The Memorial Gifts were in memory of G.M.King and Reg Hatt (£35). The loan from the 400 Trust (£150) in 1992 was towards the publication of the history. This will be repaid on demand or after the project breaks even.

All the other items are self explanatory.

PERPETUITY ACCOUNT; This was originally The Caesar Bequest, given by one of the Caesar brothers to be used on donations as the Committee decided. Subsequently other Old Boys gave anonymous amounts for the same purpose, so the name was changed.

COLLEGE ACCOUNT; This was the School Fund originally, to be used for grants to the school for projects approved by the Committee. The same now applies to the College. The last grant was for places in the Tall Ships Race in 1989.

HISTORY PROJECT ACCOUNT; This consists of advance deposits taken for the book. Some members who paid have not ordered a copy. Where a member has died, every effort has been made to contact his family to see if they want a copy or a refund. After seven years from the date of publication any unclaimed deposits will be transferred to the General Account.

LIFE MEMBERSHIP ACCOUNT; This holds the capital sum paid by Life members together with any further donations from Life members. Periodically the accumulated interest is transferred to the General Account and capital is used, as authorised by the Committee for special projects, such as the history.

GENERAL INFORMATION; A small amount of funds are kept with the Midland Bank on current accounts operated on a free banking basis. The balance is kept in identified, high interest accounts with the Halifax Building Society that are open to clubs and societies, and on which tax is deducted at source from interest received.

#### **Obituaries**

ROY ROBERTS, CBE (1940-45) died in 1993, which should have been reported in the last Newsletter. Roy was an engineer who not only excelled in his profession but achieved high managerial status.

He started as an apprentice at the RAE and progressed through industry to become Chairman of Simon Engineering and Deputy Chairman of the Dowty group of companies. In 1990 he was elected President of the Institute of Engineering. Throughout his career he was involved in student and graduate affairs, particularly training and employment.

EARNEST THURSTON (1929-34) was a keen sportsman, both at the school and after, playing football for the OFA and cricket for Farnham and Sevenoaks, in addition to being a member of Reading Athletic Club. Ernest joined Watney, Combe and Reid where he found himself in the company of Ralph Meddows Taylor and Eddie Glynn. After war service in the RAF he returned to Watneys and was soon transferred to Sevenoaks, followed by Hastings and Brighton, where he remained after retirement in 1982 having been 49 years with the company and its successors. He married Sybil Waller, an old girl of FGGS, and in 1992 they celebrated their golden wedding anniversary.

HARVEY FROST (1947-48) was one of three brothers who attended the school. The family was evacuated from Palestine to South Africa at the outbreak of the war, hence his late arrival at FGS. Harvey was a chartered accountant and practised in Tavistock. Much involved in local affairs, he was a former Mayor of the town and Chairman of the West Devon District Council. His elder Brother David died in 1978. Basil Frost has retired from banking and is currently busy helping with the local talking newspaper.

The Farnham Herald contained details of the death in the USA of PETER QUARTERMAN (1952-). Peter served in the Merchant Navy and then moved to America where he was involved in the tanker cleaning services. His two daughters are making their life in America.

The Herald also gave details of the death of KEN GORDON who left the school in about 1948. We have no details but will publish any that we receive in a subsequent edition.
